All My Love by Jonathan Ogden








WISDOM IN WORDS

With every word, he will come to life before your eyes until his last breath. His feast is celebrated on July 4th internationally.



BEAUTY OF EXAMPLE


Blessed Solanus Casey

"We must be faithful to the present moment or we will frustrate the plan of God for our lives."

This was said by a man who endure many hardships throughout his life, yet he saw everything as a gift from the Lord. A young man of Wisconsin in the late 1800s, Bernard, at the time, worked on his family's farm along with other trades. Upon seeing the harsh conditions of sin in the world, he longed to do something about it. This drew him to enter the high school seminary for the diocesan priesthood, yet they required much study in the German language. Struggling with this, he was asked to leave and consider joining a religious order. He became a Capuchin Friar and was given the name Solanus. To his disdain, the Capuchins also were German speaking, so his difficulties in his priestly studies continued, yet his superior had mercy on him. They chose to ordain him, but limit his priestly office to being a mere doorkeeper at the convent, feeding those who came to the door physically and spiritually. Although he was unable to preach or hear confessions, the doorstep would be flooded with individuals seeking the guidance of this humble friar wherever he was assigned: Detroit or New York. His reputation as a man of prophecy and healing spread throughout the cities, to Catholics, Protestants, and even Atheists, yet he took his ministry seriously with great love. He thanked the Lord daily for the gift of being a doorkeeper to serve his two greatest loves in the footsteps of Jesus and Francis: the sick and the poor. His only desire was to serve his brothers and sisters in need day and night until he died at the age of 86 in Detroit in 1957. Pope Francis beatified him in this same city just four years ago. May we too seek to give all the glory to Our Lord in thanksgiving for every path of life and mission that he leads us to, even if it isn't what we would have hoped for. His feast day is celebrated on July 30th.

An Ordinary Martyr: Blessed Stanley Rother Martyrs ... they gave their lives a long time ago or if now, it is in countries we aren't necessarily close to. Think again. This short film I came across recently of this priest from Oklahoma who gave his life out of love for his flock in Guatemala in 1980. Only twenty short minutes long, this film will make you consider yourself. "If the Lord invited to me to be killed tomorrow for his sake, would I be okay with it? BLOOD OF CHRIST

This month of July, the Catholic Church is dedicated to taking the intimacy we have found in the Sacred Heart of Jesus to a deeper level by being washed in His Precious Blood. This devotion to His Most Holy Blood stems from an adoration of the wounds of Christ on the Cross, particularly the side wound which when pierced, His Sacred Heart poured forth a stream of blood and water. This month, I challenge you to look at the depictions of Christ Crucified in your home. Do they look realistic? Is there a drop of blood on him? If not, why is that?... Maybe you have a tendency to shy ways from the bloody depictions of our Savior, to see him bruised, beaten, and bloodied out of profuse love for you. We may never be comfortable with them in this state, but should we be? Was He comfortable for us? Every drop of His Sacred Blood was poured out for you. He thought of you at this moment. His love was intentional and sacrificial, beyond our comprehension. I encourage you to find at least one realistic depiction of Him to place in your home. If Our Lady chose to wipe away this blood with her own veil and embrace Her Son, blood and all, why would we not want to do the same. Return to the ancient prayer of the Anima Christi this month, so you may be hid within His wounds.
